Phyllis Lau

PHYLLIS LAU

Phyllis is Senior Lecturer and Research Lead at the Department of General Practice, Western Sydney University. Her areas of research interest include Indigenous health, chronic disease management, interprofessional collaborative care and healthcare communication. and health service delivery for the purpose of informing primary health care policy reform, particularly related to culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) and disadvantaged population groups.

She has been awarded several research grants over the years including National health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) project grants and fellowship grants and Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) awards. She is or has been a Chief Investigator in 15 funded projects (including 2 NHMRC project grants) and the primary investigator in 9. She has also been a Chief investigator in 5 government agency-tendered or commissioned projects, and a Cooperative Research Centre (CRC) funded project.

Phyllis' expertise is in mixed-methods research. She has experience in various study designs including randomised controlled trials, descriptive quantitative studies, qualitative studies (predominantly phenomenological design), interviews, focus groups, quantitative/qualitative/mixed-methods surveys including Delphi consensus surveys for management pathway development and case studies.

Phyllis has joint appointments at the University of Melbourne – Honorary

Associate Professor at the Melbourne Dental School and Senior Lecturer at the Department of General Practice. Phyllis is also research adviser for Hong Kong Tuen Mun Hospital Family Medicine Department, and a visiting academic at the University of Malaya. She holds active national advocacy and leadership roles. She is the President of the Australasian Association for Academic Primary Care (AAAPC) that advocates for high quality primary care research, education and practice. She is also a founding member of the Pharmacy Oral Health Alliance that advocates on a politically challenging platform for accessible oral health care through non-dental health professionals.

CHRISTABEL HOE What is an Academic Registrar?

I am Christabel Hoe, and I am the Western Sydney University Academic Registrar for 2023. I am extremely grateful to be provided with this opportunity through RACGP to undertake a different path in my general practice training in such a supportive team environment. I am working with the department looking at parental attitudes towards topical corticosteroid use in eczema management.

The academic registrar post is a great way to gain experience in both research undertakings and teaching. The research component allows you to gain a glimpse behind clinical guidelines and advice, in a way that cannot be attained purely through clinical practice. This additional dimension will provide you with the chance to learn in a completely different way. This may be in the form of putting together an ethics proposal

or presenting your findings at a conference for the very first time!

In addition to research, you are exposed to an abundance of invaluable teaching opportunities. Being able to lead large group tutorials is an exciting experience you don't often get as a registrar. It is not uncommon to be inspired by the ideas that are bounced off in these associated discussions.

Overall, the academic post is an exciting way to learn about a different side of primary care in the best way possible, and I would encourage future GP registrars to apply!

Update from our Senior Lecturers

2023 has been another busy year for teaching in the department.

We started with the year 5 conference week, where the Department of General Practice took the lead in providing a comprehensive program for our final-year students in January. We also had significant involvement in the year 4 conference week in June, running 4 separate workshops in one day including suturing, ENT, MSK, and safe opioid prescribing. We have been supported by several of our excellent affiliate GP and non-GP specialist colleagues who graciously took time out of their busy schedules to assist with the workshops.

It is not just conference weeks that the department has been involved in; our team of senior lecturers are responsible for GP teaching to the students in various stages of their MD program. Dr. Miriam Brooks continues to oversee the Year 5 GP placements, supporting students and providing additional back-to-base sessions

on Fridays. Dr. Winston Lo oversees year 3 students' GP teaching, coordinating with the Medicines in Contexts team during student placements. Dr. Yasin Shahab is responsible for the Year 1 and 2 students, organising Year 1 & 2 GP workshops and ensuring students get early exposure to the world of general practice.
